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## NORTH SYDNEY COUNCIL ELECTIONS What you need to know



## VOTING IS COMPULSORY

All residents who are registered on the electoral roll must vote in the election. If you do not vote, and cannot provide a valid reason for not voting, you risk being fined.

## OPTIONS FOR VOTING

On election day


If you vote on election day, you must vote at a polling place within your Ward between 8 am and 6 pm (see list of polling places on page 3). Please note, if you are not in the North Sydney local government area on election day, you will need to vote another way.

Pre-poll


Due to COVID-19, pre-poll voting is encouraged and will take place from Monday 22 November to Friday 3 December at two pre-poll venues in North Sydney and Neutral Bay (see details on page 3). You can vote in either pre-poll venue if you choose this option.

## WHAT IS NEW THIS ELECTION?

This year 10 councillors will be elected to serve a two year and nine month term on Council. The term was initially reduced from four to three years to bring all local government elections on to the same cycle, and was further reduced due to the pandemic. Five councillors will be elected in each of the two Wards.
This election, the mayor will not be elected by popular vote but by a vote of councillors at their first meeting. The mayor will serve a two-year term and then councillors will vote on the position of mayor again for a nine-month term.

## What prompted the change?

Since the 1980s, the mayor of North Sydney has been popularly elected by voters. In 2017, voters were asked via a Constitutional Referendum
whether they favoured the election of the mayor by councillors for a term of two years. The majority (52\%) voted yes so the change has been implemented for the 2021 election.
As a result of this referendum, the NSW Electoral Commission advised Council that we must have an equal number of councillors in each Ward. It also advised that we would have 10 councillors, not nine, as the Council had thought when it proposed and adopted the referendum question.

This meant two Ward options were possible - five Wards of two councillors or two Wards of five. The North Sydney local government area is only 10 square kilometres, so two Wards of five was considered the better option.

Postal voting


You can apply for a postal vote pack from Tuesday 26 October until Monday 29 November. Completed postal votes must be returned by 6pm, Friday 17 December.

iVote applications open on Monday 22 November and close at 1 pm on Saturday 4 December. iVote voting closes at 6 pm , 4 December.

As a thank you for taking time to tell us what you think, interested participants will receive a colouring book designed by a local artist Raisa Kross and a mini pencil pack. The colouring book is suitable for children and adults and showcases iconic North Sydney landmarks and hidden gems. The Community Strategic Plan is developed and delivered by Council in partnership with NSW Government agencies, business and industry groups, community groups and individuals. In addition to the feedback gathered from residents, ratepayers and other stakeholders, Council will draw on the results of the 2020 Customer Satisfaction Survey, the 2021 Liveability Census and

For its part in implementing the plan, Council lists its responsibilities within the accompanying long-term Resourcing Strategy and a four-year Delivery Program. The Community Strategic Plan guides the development of the fouryear Delivery Program which becomes the single point of reference for how Council will spend its funds and what projects and services it will deliver during the term of the elected Council. The Delivery Program will include financial estimates for Council's budget position for the period 2022/23 to 2025/26.
