PURPOSE:

The purpose of this report is to provide an update on North Sydney Councils' Sustainability Rebates Program since its inception in October 2023.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

- The Sustainability Rebates program launched in October 2023 and supports properties in North Sydney to implement energy and water saving initiatives for households, strata and businesses.
- The Sustainability Rebates program has proven to be well received by the North Sydney community and has had a strong up take of rebates across all property types and most rebate items available.
- Since program inception, Council has approved 41 community applications and has allocated over half the annual budget over a three- month period.

RECOMMENDATION:

1. THAT the report on the Sustainability Rebates Program be received.

Background

From March-June 2023, the North Sydney community was consulted to gain feedback on a proposed sustainability rebates program. A total of 89 responses were received from the community with most respondents indicating that a rebate program would make a difference in whether they would take action to adopt clean energy technology and transition to all electric homes and apartment buildings.

As a result, the Sustainability Rebates Program was launched in October 2023, with a program budget of \$80,000 funded from Council's Environment Levy.

Report

The key statistics for the program so far include:

- 41 approved rebate applications (See Figs. 1 and 3).
- 99 kW solar PV approved.
- 42 kWh solar batteries approved.
- \$331,029 community spend.
- \$43,894 Council rebate spend.
- 7.5 community investment to rebate ratio.
- Approved rebates for all three property types (See Fig. 2).
- Even spread of approved rebates across the North Sydney LGA (See Fig. 4).
- 428 visits to the Sustainability Rebates webpage since program launch.
- Positive feedback provided by the community and program participants (See Fig. 5)

NEXT STEPS

An annual review of the program will commence before the end of the financial year to determine which rebate items will be kept in the program for FY24/25. The review process will be on-going to ensure Council is providing rebates that are best placed to serve the community and assist with emission reductions.

Currently there are 5 rebate items that have not yet been applied for including Business Kitchen Electrification, Rainwater Tanks, Sydney Water's Waterfix Program, Business Level 2 Energy Audit and Rooftop Solar Health Check. Informal feedback from the community has identified potential rebate items that are not currently included in the rebate program including:

- Smart meter board upgrades
- Micro Grid rebate
- Technical advice for engineering or electrical work for strata
- E-bikes
- Green Energy
- Disconnection from gas

A more detailed evaluation of the resident experience in this program will commence closer to the end of the financial year and will include both quantitative and qualitative evaluation. Community feedback will assist to determine the level of support provided by Council is appropriate and to best ensure the program funding is fully allocated each financial year.

Funding

Based on the current rate of program expenditure it is expected that the funding for the Sustainability Rebates program will be fully allocated before the end of the financial year. After all program funds have been spent, the community will not be able to apply for a rebate until the start of the 24/25 financial year. North Sydney residents will be placed on a waitlist for individual rebate items and notified on 1 July 2024 when they can apply.

Other Sydney based Councils offering a rebate program have not received any negative community feedback about this process and have been able to manage any reputational risk by providing regular community updates on available funding, similar to the update that was sent in the February Green Events newsletter (See Fig 6 below).

SUSTAINABILITY REBATES

North Sydney Council Sustainability Rebates

In the three months since the rebates program opened, the North Sydney community has well and truly embraced the rebates on offer, with over half the annual program budget being allocated to support clean energy technology and all electric homes and apartment buildings.

The rebate program offers residents the opportunity to receive some 'cash back' on a range of different items including solar pv, solar batteries, hot water heat pumps, EV charging & rainwater tanks.

Don't wait until it is too late as funding is limited and rebates can only be applied for up to 12 months from the installation of a rebate item.

Consultation requirements

Financial/Resource Implications

This project is funded through Council's Environment Levy. The project budget is \$80,000 with funds being allocated for direct community rebates, minimal service fees and a software platform to process the rebates.

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this report is to provide an update on the community circular economy initiatives being hosted at the Coal Loader Centre for Sustainability. These initiatives include the Sydney Library of Things and the Fix-It Hub repair café.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

- The Sydney Library of Things (TSLoT) and the Fix-It Hub are two circular economy initiatives being hosted at the Coal Loader.
- TSLoT currently has 30 volunteers and 126 active memberships with 1,259 item loans since opening in November 2021.
- The Fix-It Hub is undertaking a 6-month trial which will be completed in April 2024. Following review, it is anticipated an ongoing commitment to run the repair café will be formalised with TSLoT.

RECOMMENDATION:

1. THAT the update on circular economy initiatives at the Coal Loader report be received.

Background

The Coal Loader currently hosts two community initiatives that work towards achieving a circular economy in the North Sydney local government area. The Sydney Library of Things (TSLoT) and the Fix-It Hub are both models of circular economy programs developed to keep items out of landfill and embody the principles of reuse, repair, and share.

TSLoT was established at the Coal Loader Centre for Sustainability in 2021 and has been operating successfully for the last 2 years. The Fix-It Hub, established in a response to a Councillor notice of motion in October 2022, is currently in a 6-month trial period, and will be reviewed in April 2024.

Report

The Sydney Library of Things

Established in early 2021 and in operation since November 2021, TSLoT has undergone substantial growth with currently 30 volunteers and 126 active memberships. A Christmas discount membership special resulted in 14 new annual memberships, and it is anticipated numbers will continue to steadily rise over the year. TSLoT is now financially secure with growing membership numbers and associated fees.

In addition to customer service staff and the core organising group, TSLoT now have an established maintenance team who conduct fortnightly maintenance sessions to ensure the upkeep and safety auditing of items.

There are currently 286 items which can be borrowed with the top 10 shown in Table 1 below.

TSLoT recently passed 1000 loans, with the current figure of 1,259 loans made since opening in November 2021.

Marketing is undertaken by the group, and they now have 443 subscribers to the newsletter that is sent out every 4-6 weeks. Social media remains the main avenue for marketing and their online presence continues to increase. There are currently 3,665 Facebook followers (an increase of 239) and 1,321 Instagram followers (an increase of 217). Figure 1 below shows the demographics of the TSLoT audience.

As noted in the last update report, the success of TSLoT at The Coal Loader Centre for Sustainability has encouraged other councils to open a library of things (LoT) in their local government areas (LGA). The Lane Cove LoT will be opening in late February and the Randwick LoT is planned to open in mid-2024. At present the group is also in discussion with Hunter's Hill and Northern Beaches Council's.

With the increasing success of the program, the current location at the Coal Loader is proving limited in space for storing the number of loan items. The group have begun discussions with Council staff regarding the extension of the space into the next available workshop at the Coal Loader.

<u>Fix-It Hub</u>

The Fix-it Hub was established by The Sydney Library of Things (TSLoT) in collaboration with Council staff, to support Councils sustainability programs and address a Councillor notice of motion on the need for, and establishment of, a repair café in the North Sydney area.

Initial stages of project development identified the need to trial the Fix-It Hub for a 6-month period to effectively analyse the strengths, weaknesses, and opportunities before further commitment. This review, scheduled for April 2024, will allow for changes to be made to the delivery format before commencing a longer-term commitment.

Currently the Fix-It Hub operates on the second Saturday of the month (10am-1pm) from the Mess Hall at The Coal Loader Centre for Sustainability. To date, four Hubs have been held with increasing numbers of items being repaired at each event (see Table 2 below).

From a base of three volunteers, there are now 12 volunteers across several repair categories including electrical, clothing, jewellery, hand sowing, tool sharpening and customer service. Items for repair vary greatly and have included toasters, lamps, hair irons, skirts, trousers, umbrellas, chairs, toys, secateurs, scissors, DVD/CD players and even an audio cassette player. Success rate with repairs is approximately 75% each month.

Following the trial period review and given the increasing success of the project to date, it is anticipated that the Fix-It Hub will continue at the Coal Loader and a launch event will be planned for April/May 2024.

TSLoT thank North Sydney Council for their continued support and look forward to an ongoing relationship at The Coal Loader Centre for Sustainability.

Consultation requirements

Community engagement is not required.

Financial/Resource Implications

The Fix-It Hub is funded through Council's Environmental Levy and has been budgeted for in the FY 23/24 Coal Loader events program.
