#### **PURPOSE:**

This report provides a summary of the annual Nan Manefield Young Writer's Award as run by Stanton Library.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

The annual Nan Manefield Young Writers' Award was announced in Library and Information Week, May 2020. This is the 31st year that the award has been run by North Sydney Council, and the 6th in honour of Nan Manefield.

This year the restrictions placed by COVID-19 shutdowns created an environment for Stanton Library to move contact with the local community to almost entirely online. It also provided great opportunity through this award, for engagement with school students and their families while they were homeschooling during COVID-19 isolation.

A number of new measures were developed to replace in-person contact of previous years. Highlights include moving the Awards Night to a video presentation and the publication of an eBook of the winning entries.

The quality and amount of entries remained strong with nearly 300 entries, over 30 schools represented, and the winners received prizes totaling nearly \$4,000.

#### BACKGROUND

The Young Writer's Award was first held in 1990. In 1998 it was named for former Councillor, the late Dr Bill Coppell, and in 2015, in honor of Nan Manefield.

The late Nan Manefield was a Librarian at North Sydney Boys High School and a lifelong champion of literacy and local history, giving 30 years of service as a citizen member on several of Council's Library and Historical Services Committees.

### **DETAIL**

This year was the 31st year of the Award and it was a very successful year, given the restrictions related to COVID-19 and the temporary library closure. It was possible to make changes to all aspects of the running of the award in order to bring it online.

There were a substantial number of entries, showing that both local school and individuals were keen to write and engage with the award. The judges noted that the quality of entries was as strong as in previous years.

The highlights of moving this award online included;

The 3 Writing Masterclasses that were opened to place getters in the award and conducted on Zoom by one of the judges; Will Kostakis.

The publishing of an eBook of the winning entries and making this eBook available via BorrowBox for all members of the community to borrow and read. This was facilitated by Megan Tolnay [Customer Experience Librarian] and was very well received by schools and families.

In place of the annual Awards Night, an announcement video was created. This featured the judges announcing each winner, and the winners speaking about their writing inspiration and reading their winning pieces. Each of the winners and the judges filmed themselves at home and sent in their clips for inclusion. Ben Sutton, Council's Digital Communications officer filmed the Mayor for this video presentation and completed the editing of the final video. This video can be viewed on the North Sydney Council YouTube page, and to date it has received 320 views.

Other Covid-19 related changes included: All entries were submitted electronically via the website. All communication with the judges was via email and entries allocated to judge's via file sharing. Winner's certificates and prizes were sent by post, and cash prizes were electronically transferred. Promotion through social media including the new Stanton Library Instagram account @Stanton Library

The judges of the award are award winning, published authors: Will Kostakis, Ceridwen Dovey, Tim Sinclair, Erin Gough, and Ursula Dubosarsky (the Current Australian Children's Laureate).

Prizes totaled nearly \$4000. Sponsors of the Award are: North Sydney Council, Ensemble Theatre, Sydney Living Museums, Taronga Zoo, Wildlife Sydney Zoo, World Book, Books Kinokuniya, and The Constant Reader Bookshop.

The 2020 major prize winners for the five age groups were:

13 years: Emma Baldwin for A Piece of Home

14-15 years: Elizabeth Sutherland for Somewhere Else
