8.24. Nan Manefield Young Writers Award 2021

PURPOSE:

This report provides a summary of the annual Nan Manefield Young Writer's Award as run by Stanton Library.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Winners of the 32nd Young Writers' Award were announced at a presentation evening at Stanton Library during Australian Library and Information Week, May 2021.

A total of 325 entries were received from across the Sydney Metropolitan region, with over 30 schools represented.

The presentation event was smaller than in previous years due to COVID restrictions, with the Winning and Highly Commended entrants attending with their families.

Judges of all five age categories were in attendance to speak about the entries, provide general feedback and give insight into their choices when awarding the prizes. Winners received prizes totaling nearly \$4,000.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

There is an allocated budget of \$5,000 to deliver the Young Writers' Award annually.

BACKGROUND

The Young Writer's Award was first held in 1990. In 1998 it was named for former Councillor, the late Dr Bill Coppell, and in 2015, in honor of Nan Manefield.

The late Nan Manefield was a Librarian at North Sydney Boys High School and a lifelong champion of literacy and local history, giving 30 years of service as a citizen member on several of Council's Library and Historical Services Committees.

DETAIL

This was the 32nd year of the Award and Library staff, judges and families were excited to see the 'in-person' presentation evening return to Stanton.

There was a total of 325 entries in 2021, which is consistent with recent years despite the difficulties that COVID has caused for families and schools over the last year. The largest proportion of entrants was in the 16-18 years category, showing the high level of independent interest in creative writing. Entries in many categories included talented students encouraged to enter by their teachers and included interest from schools across the Sydney metropolitan area. The judges noted that while there were fewer than usual entries in the younger categories, the overall quality was very high.

The Library is grateful for the ongoing support of the five judges, who are all award-winning, published authors: Will Kostakis, Ceridwen Dovey, Tim Sinclair, Erin Gough and Ursula Dubosarsky.

Judge Ursula Dubosarsky, current Australian Children's Laureate, will present writing masterclasses offered to all prize winners during the upcoming July school holidays.
